ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The EJN monitors and evaluates the impact of its work. We seek to ensure that all of its activities are gender-balanced in terms of participation and that its work increases interest in and improves recognition of the value of ethical journalism.

The following figures give an estimate of EJN reach during the year. They show that its work has reached far more than the participants we have invited to its core activities (which altogether number around 350).

In all, from January to December 2016, the EJN carried out 102 programme-related actions including 75 activities where there was direct contact with target groups - journalists and media executives; media academics and students of journalism; policymakers and civil society groups. The estimated impact of these actions is as follows:

- We have reached around 1,748 policy makers and civil society leaders, representing national governments, international organisations and non-government groups, all of them dealing with media and with a particular interest in media ethics and the focus issues of our programme. The EJN has joined the European Union Media Literacy Expert Panel in January 2016 and joined the UNESCO global media literacy leadership. We submitted a working paper for the World Media Literacy Congress in Brazil in November 2016.
- We reached 2,285 media companies and industry representatives in particular related to work on good-governance and ethical media management, combating hate-speech and editorial standards in reporting migration.
- We reached 2,040 journalism students and teachers at universities in Hong Kong, Jordan, and Palestine as well as
 the international student bodies of universities in Norway, the United Kingdom, Italy and Spain. An important
 example of impact of work has been the success in uniting the six universities teaching journalism in Palestine
 where the EJN 5-point test for hate-speech and accompanying materials are being advanced in the major
 journalism schools, including the universities of Birzeit, Al-Quds and An-Najar.
- We reached 605 representatives of media support groups including journalists' unions, media development groups, media monitoring bodies and press councils.

As a result, the EJN 5-point test for hate-speech and the EJN guidelines on migration reporting have been disseminated and promoted within the networks of these groups.

It is a further indicator of the successful up take of work that the 5-point test for hate speech has been translated into more than 20 languages. The 2016 EJN Guidelines for Migration Reporting has been translated into ten languages. It is a measure of the impact of this work that all but two of the 30 translations have been paid for and distributed by organisations supporting the EJN and its work.

Fundraising activities

During this period, the EJN did not engage in any direct fund-raising work. This was included in the work programme for 2017-2018.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment policy and objectives

The financial position of the EJN is as set out in the accounts. During this period the EJN received grants from the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and from UNESCO to carry out work in the Western Balkans, Africa, the Middle East and China.

The EJN has no investments and therefore no investment policy has been agreed. This is a subject which will be dealt with during 2018. The EJN has no major reserves. Although it has accrued funds and deferred income for further work in pursuit of its objects which is included in the cash available in the current account.

Going concern

The EJN is a going concern and received further grant support with renewed contracts from UNESCO and the Norwegian Foreign Ministry to continue its programme of activities up to April 1st 2018.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006. The Articles of Association were reviewed at the Board meeting in October 2016. At the EJN annual meeting on January 20th 2017 the following resolution on Amendments to EJN Articles of Association, was agreed:

The Board of Trustees of the EJN, meeting on 20th January 2017, agreed to make the following changes to the Article of Association to give effect to the following principles:

- That the Board of Trustees is the sovereign authority of the EJN;
- That the Board of Trustees and shall be responsible for the financial oversight and administration of the EJN and its activities, in line with the EJN's status as a registered Charity
- That the Board of Trustees shall appoint the Director who, with the Chair, will have the right to act and speak on behalf of the EJN
- That the Board of Trustees shall also appoint new members of staff according to an agreed procedure established with the Director
- That the Board of Trustees shall nominate and appoint a panel of external advisors to give advice on the work of the EJN and its activities
- That all decisions by the advisory panel and meetings of network supporters shall be advisory in nature and submitted to the Board of Trustees for endorsement
- That media, journalism and media support groups, appropriate academic and journalism education institutions
 and civil society organisations with an interest in media and journalism may become EJN supporters according to
 rules adopted by the Board of Trustees
- That the Board of Trustees shall decide upon the conditions to be fulfilled for organisations to be included on the EJN list of recognised supporters
- That the election to the Board of Trustees shall take place at the Annual Meeting of the EJN Board of Trustees,
- That the annual meeting shall also appoint an Administrative Committee of three to meet as required between meetings of the Board of Trustees
- That all members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected for a period of three years with the possibility of
 election for a second term of three years
- · That the size of the Board shall not exceed 12 in number
- That the quorum for a meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be three
- That the Chair of the EJN Board of Trustees shall exercise a casting vote in the event of a tied vote at Board meetings
- That the Chair and Members of the Board of Trustees shall have the right to speak on behalf of the EJN unless the Board decides otherwise. The process by which board members and others are given permission to speak on behalf requires approval from the Director and or Chair.
- That the Board of Trustees shall organise, around the time of annual meeting, a meeting of EJN supporters.

Following the adoption of this resolution, the Board elected Dorothy Byrne, Ashok Gupta and Bernt Olufsen to serve on the EJN Administrative Committee.

Organisational structure

The company, which operates under the name Ethical Journalism Network, commenced in June 2013 and was registered as a charity on 12 March 2016 (registered Charity Commission no. 1166150).

The Directors meet as a Board at least four times a year to determine the general policy of the Charitable Company and to review its overall management and control for which they are legally responsible. The day to day running of the Company is delegated to Aidan White in his capacity as CEO.

The Network held meetings of its Board and members in Brussels in March, in Oslo in July and London in October 2016 at which the constitution and framework for EJN work as a charity registered in the UK was agreed. Further meetings were held in January 2017 in London and Oslo in April 2017. The minutes and records of these meetings are available for inspection at the registered offices of the EJN. The Directors give of their time freely and no remuneration was paid in the year.

REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE MEMBERS OF ETHICAL JOURNALISM NETWORK

We have audited the financial statements of Ethical Journalism Network for the period ended 31st March 2017 on pages nine to seventeen. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD 12TH MARCH 2016 TO 31ST MARCH 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment

- 50% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
