Trustees Report for the year ended 31 March 2023

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 March 2023. The Annual Report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic Report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

Aims and objectives

The Ethical Journalism Network (EJN) is founded in the underlying belief that ethics and respect for human rights, particularly freedom of expression, are core elements of democracy.

The EJN exists to promote high ethical standards in journalism. Those ethical standards are reflected in the principles for journalists of reporting:

- With accuracy and based upon facts
- Independently
- Impartially
- · With humanity and respect for others, and
- Responsibly and with accountability.

What we do

- <u>Networking:</u> We connect and support a network of diverse media and civil society organisations who are united through a commitment to the five core principles of ethical journalism and the conviction that they are central to democracy and human rights.
- <u>Education</u>: We support and enable journalists and media practitioners to share expertise and develop their skills to uphold ethical standards and equip them to understand and overcome challenges they may face in doing so.
- Facilitation: We support and strengthen media organisations to embed ethical practices.
- Research: We publish useful research to highlight and increase understanding of ethical challenges facing
 journalists today and to increase understanding of the consequences of journalism which does not uphold
 ethical standards.
- <u>Amplify</u>: We support and encourage efforts by the media development and press freedom community to create at all levels a safe, secure, and professional environment to undertake independent journalism.

Strategic priorities

During the year the Board approved a series of strategic priorities to focus the company's activities:

- To strengthen the craft of journalism by increasing skill levels and improving the knowledge of ethical principles within the media.
- To promote respect for the status of journalism and raise awareness of current ethical challenges affecting the work of journalists including the importance of ethics, human rights, and good governance both in the exercise of journalism and in the administration of news media.
- To build a strong and supportive global network to strengthen cooperation between media professional groups at national and international level, including regional affiliations.
- To encourage dialogue and collaborative working between the media community, civil society, and policy
 makers to raise awareness of the value of informed, ethical journalism in advancing human rights, conflict
 resolution and the promotion of racial tolerance, equality, and diversity.

Review of activities

During the year, the EJN has continued to deliver a range of projects and activities in pursuit of the above aims and strategic priorities, despite the challenging internal circumstances. The EJN has during the year fulfilled its commitments which include:

- Completing the 'Building Trust in Journalism in Central Eastern Europe' project, in partnership with Evens Foundation and supported by Fritt Ord. Since 2020, the EJN has researched and produced a series of reports on the respective media landscapes of Poland, Hungary, Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Slovakia and Georgia. The report on Ukraine was due to be published in February 2022 but was delayed due to the Russian invasion. The report was updated to examine the impact of the invasion on Ukraine's media landscape and was finally published as 'Ukraine media: defiance and truth-telling the frontline struggle for information and democracy' in July 2023. In the interim period, the EJN commissioned a series of essays on the ethical challenges of reporting conflict; these were published on the EJN website in English with Ukrainian and Russian translations. The report was launched at the Brussels Press Club on 10th July 2023 with a panel discussion featuring media leaders from Ukraine as well as specialists from UNESCO, Reporters sans frontières (RSF), the Global Forum for Media Development (GFMD), and the EJN.
- Delivering Phase 2 of 'Building Trust in Media in South East Europe & Turkey' in partnership with UNESCO and funded by the European Union Directorate-General for Neighbourhood and Enlargement Negotiations (DG NEAR). The EJN continues to support media outlets in South East Europe and Turkey to carry out selfassessment exercises of their commitment to good governance and ethical and professional standards – also referred to as ethical audits. The EJN's project activities also included:
 - o publication of reports from media organisations in Macedonia, Montenegro and Serbia having undergone the self-assessment process, and the production of a podcast with the Journalism Trust Initiative's Project Coordinator:
 - o gathering representatives of media organisations from across the region to attend a conference in Istanbul in September 2022 to discuss issues of transparency, self-assessment and new business models in a regional context facing extraordinary challenges;
 - o convening an inter-Mediterranean workshop held in October 2022 in Cyprus, on hate speech and peace journalism for colleagues from Turkey, Greece and Cyprus;
 - o participation in the development of the Journalism Trust Initiative (JTI) launched by RSF. This is a transparency tool designed to promote trustworthy journalism. Media outlets can use the tool to check, disclose and promote compliance of their editorial processes with best practices.
- Completing the 'Journalism Education for Democracy in Ukraine: Developing Standards, Standards, Integrity and Professionalism (DESTIN)' project, funded by the EU's Professionalism Erasmus and Key Action 2 (KA2) project. The EJN participated in this project to review and enhance the media environment in which Ukrainian journalism graduates will work. This included improving media literacy and raising public awareness of the vital role of journalists and media in a democracy. EJN representatives attended the final DESTIN conference held in Poland in November 2022. The work was further highlighted in a section on journalism education in the EJN's report, 'Ukraine media: defiance and truth-telling the frontline struggle for information and democracy', supported by the DESTIN project.
- Reporting the results of the 'Structural racism in UK newsrooms' project, supported by the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust. The EJN completed its first active UK project with the publication of its research in March 2023. The report is based on 27 in-depth interviews with Black journalists and stakeholders who have or are currently working in national mainstream media newsrooms across print, online and broadcast media. It concludes that although the proportion of Black African and Caribbean journalists has increased in recent years, and there has been a heightened sense of the possibility for change since 2021 with the increased momentum of the Black Lives Matter movement, Black journalists interviewed confirmed that newsroom processes continued to be exclusionary and racism commonplace. The report, which makes a number of recommendations to address structural racism in UK newsrooms, was launched with a panel discussion between prominent journalists of colour and academics and was hosted by the Sir Lenny Henry Centre for Media Diversity and The Film and Television Charity. The launch was attended by specially invited guests from the news and media industry with the specific aim of influencing and informing prominent stakeholders; the event was also live-streamed and a recording of the event is available on the EJN's YouTube channel. The report has received national media and social media coverage and has been the subject of discussion amongst industry stakeholders.

Other activities in this period:

- In June 2022, the European Fact-Checking Standards Network (EFCSN) published a report summarising the results of surveys and interviews carried out in recent months about the future European Code of Standards for Fact-Checking and Open Source Investigation Operations, laying out the commitments required for someone to be recognised as an independent, credible and ethical fact-checker or open source investigator in Europe. Aidan White, the EJN's founder and president, was one of 17 experts interviewed for this project and his comments are featured in the report.
- In September 2022, The Stanley Center for Peace and Security published 'Setting Your Moral Compass: A Workbook for Applied Ethics in OSINT'. The publication was inspired by the Stanley Center's collaboration with the EJN on a series of 28 interviews with analysts and journalists who use open-source analysis to inform their work on international security and non-proliferation policy, originally published in the report, 'Feeling the Burden: Ethical Challenges and Practices in Open Source Analysis and Journalism' in January 2022.
- In November 2022, the Aljazeera Media Institute (AMI) launched its Ethics in Journalism course, led by EJN
 founder and president, Aidan White. The free online course explores the importance of ethical behaviour in
 journalism and why it is important to build public trust in news media in this age of the internet, fake news,
 disinformation and global communications. The course is part of AMI's eLearning programme of media courses.
- Utilisation of the EJN's resources, including publications, infographics, podcasts and videos, by RSF's JTI Knowledge Base and by the International Organisation for Migration's Global Migration Media Academy, for educational purposes.
- The EJN was a signatory to the Perugia Declaration for Ukraine in April 2022, took part in promoting World News Day in September 2022, and joined more than 100 media leaders from around the world in supporting RSF's campaign calling for the release of Hong Kong press freedom emblem Jimmy Lai in May 2023.

From a project-delivery perspective, as shown above, the year has been a success with projects delivered fully aligned with the EJN objectives. The EJN engages with associates and draws upon the goodwill of experts passionate about ethical journalism to deliver these projects. The delivery of projects, managing a business, ensuring regulatory compliance, planning new activities and seeking the funding to execute those ambitions, are an onerous, unrelenting series of tasks for the EJN's team of two. The Director & CEO, Zoe Greenfield, resigned in November 2022 which required the Trustees to reconsider the way forward for the EJN. A well-organised handover of activities was managed in the period before Zoe left, including members of the Board of Trustees stepping up to ensure the EJN activities continue and commitments are met. The Trustees would like to express their appreciation to Zoe for all she achieved in her tenure as Director & CEO, as the organisation benefited significantly from her diligent contribution. The Trustees would also like to express their appreciation to Wendy Collinson who has continued to keep the organisation moving forward through her conscientious understanding and delivery. In addition, the Trustees would like to acknowledge the work of Danica Ilic and Dr Aida Al-Kaisy in guiding our projects to their conclusions and to Aidan White for his willing and insightful contributions to all of the work of the EJN.

Following the notification of resignation of the Director & CEO in November 2022, the Board re-evaluated the priorities for the EJN given that the organisation lacked the capacity to engage a new director. The priorities were revised to focus on:

- fulfilling our commitments to existing projects and the funding partners;
- maintaining the wealth of material created through the projects undertaken over the time the EJN has been operating and ensuring that it could remain freely accessible; and
- sustaining the organisation within the current financial capacity.

To deliver these priorities, the Trustees agreed that the EJN needed to find a suitable partner that could embrace the objectives of the EJN and embed the ongoing and legacy activities into their own organisation. The Board has made progress with finding a partner and is working towards finalising an agreement that will ensure the longevity of the work of the EJN, preserve the brand, deliver a role for our remaining staff member, continue our ongoing projects and engage the networks that have been cultivated to engage with the delivery of ethical journalism.

Future plans

In the meantime, the Trustees continue to pursue new projects within the strategic and geographic scope of our work and the constraints of our available resources. These include:

- Exploring the potential role of a Scandinavian Taskforce to provide support to professional editors and journalists in European countries with low scores on the World Press Freedom Index through partnerships with media, governmental and non-governmental institutions.
- Forming a sub-committee of trustees and advisors to collaborate on an 'Al Charter in Media' project launched by RSF. EJN President, Aidan White, has joined an international committee of 21 distinguished members from 13 different countries, academics and professionals in the fields of journalism, Al and digital technologies. Led by Maria Ressa, a journalist and the 2021 Nobel Peace Prize laureate, this international committee will deliver the results of its work before the end of the year 2023. The EJN sun-committee will feed into the international committee's findings.
- Developing Phase 3 of the 'Building Trust in Media in South East Europe and Turkey' programme with UNESCO.
 This follows two already completed three-year projects. Phase 3 provides coaching and mentoring to a minimum of 14 regional media outlets through the ethical audit process and will involve facilitating meetings and workshops and promoting the project's objectives of supporting ethical journalism as a public good.
- Continuing to seek partnerships with other media organisations and funders as the key to the EJN's future and
 the preservation and proliferation of its intellectual property, as well as the furtherance of its aims and
 objectives in promoting ethical journalism as a precious resource that builds respect for democracy and human
 rights.

Financial review

Results for the year

The deficit for the year, prior to transfers between funds, on general funds was £34,837 (2022: £16,803) and the deficit on restricted funds was £3,685 (2022: £5,700).

After transfers of funds, there is a balance carried forward on general funds of £13,707 (2022: £48,962) and on restricted funds of £13,715 (2022: £16,982).

Reserves policy

The reserves policy seeks to balance spending the maximum amount of income raised as soon as possible after receipt with maintaining the minimum level of reserves to maintain uninterrupted operation. The reserves held ensure the ongoing liquidity of the organisation and would be sufficient to manage an orderly wind-up, in the unlikely event this was required. On this basis, it is assessed that holding reserves sufficient to cover overheads for a 4–6-month period is prudent for the EJN. The actual amount held will vary based on current and forecast financial circumstances.

The reserves policy has been breached. During this period of transition external assurance has been obtained to ensure the EJN can fulfil its financial obligations as they fall due.

Structure, governance, and management

<u>Constitution</u>

The EJN is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 6th June 2013. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up each member is required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Trustees

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Memorandum of Association. The EJN Board meets quarterly, or as needed.

During the period, three Trustees resigned: Kjersti Loken Stavrum, Randi Siren Ogrey and Ayshah Tull. The Board is grateful for their years of service.

Structure, governance, and management (continued)

Key management and operations

The EJN's CEO works within an authority delegated by the Board and reports formally at each Board meeting and informally, between meetings, through regular discussions with the Chair and Treasurer. The CEO works with the Administrative Assistant, consultants, the regional committees and advisory group members in delivering the activities of the EJN. Trustees lead and participate in committees to ensure alignment with strategic priorities and communication with the Board. The Trustees continue to be very grateful to all committee and advisory group members for their advice, work and time committed during the year.

Following the departure of the CEO in February 2023, the Administration Assistant has reported directly to the Chair of Trustees and the Treasurer, coordinating the day-to-day operations of the charity and its transition through the due diligence phase of a potential merger.

Policies and risk management

The Trustees have ensured that an appropriate list of policies is in place: complaints; conflict of interest; safeguarding; reserves; travel and expenses; diversity and inclusion; equal opportunities; paying staff; bullying and harassment; grievance; disciplinary; whistleblowing; and donation acceptance. Staff and consultants also undertake training as required by project partners to comply with organisational standards and local regulations.

In addition to the risk register implemented by the CEO in 2021 to monitor and mitigate organisational risks, the Treasurer and Administration Assistant meet weekly to ensure that any risks are brought to the Trustees' attention in a timely manner to enable informed decision-making. A transition schedule was developed in January 2023 to identify all operational elements affected by the loss of the CEO and to anticipate the actions required in the event of a merger. We have also reviewed and updated our insurance policy to ensure appropriate levels of coverage are in place.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2023

1. General information

Ethical Journalism Network is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the company.

The registered office is International House, Cornhill, London, EC3V 3NG.

2. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Ethical Journalism Network meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The Trustees therefore continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance Sheet. Where income is received in advance of entitlement of receipt, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent of completion of the service.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs included in support costs are allocated based on time spent.

Expenditure on charitable activities arises from directly undertaking an activity which furthers the company's objectives; the expenditure includes any associated support costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued) For the year ended 31 March 2023

2. Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset evenly over its expected useful economic life at the following annual rates:-

Equipment - 50% straight line

Assets under £200 are not capitalised on the balance sheet.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at rates of exchange ruling at the reporting date.

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate ruling on the date of the transaction.

Exchange gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments. Currently the EJN only holds cash at bank.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities comprising income debtors, cash at bank and creditors for operating costs. These assets and liabilities are initially recorded at cost and subsequently at the amounts expected to be received or paid.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions applied by donors or which have been raised by the company for discrete purposes. The costs of raising and administering the activities the funds are applied to are charged against the specific fund.
