Trustees Report for the year ended 31 March 2024

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 March 2024. The Annual Report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic Report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

Aims and objectives

The Ethical Journalism Network (EJN) is founded on the underlying belief that ethics and respect for human rights, particularly freedom of expression, are core elements of democracy.

The EJN exists to promote high ethical standards in journalism. Those standards are reflected in the five core principles of ethical journalism, namely reporting:

- with accuracy and based on facts;
- independently;
- impartially;
- with humanity and respect for others; and
- · responsibly and with accountability.

What we do

- Networking: We connect and support a network of diverse media and civil society organisations
 that are united through a commitment to the five core principles of ethical journalism and the
 conviction that they are central to democracy and human rights.
- Education: We support and enable journalists and media practitioners to share their expertise and .
 develop their skills to uphold ethical journalism and equip them to understand and overcome
 challenges they may face in doing so.
- Facilitation: We support and strengthen media organisations to embed ethical journalism practices.
- Research: We publish useful research to highlight and increase understanding of ethical challenges
 facing journalists today and to increase understanding of the consequences of journalism which
 does not uphold ethical standards.
- Amplify: We support and encourage efforts by the media development and press freedom community to create at all levels a safe, secure, and professional environment to undertake independent journalism.

Review of activities

Consistent with the series of approved strategic priorities, the EJN has continued to deliver a range of projects and undertaken despite the challenging internal circumstances. The EJN has during the year fulfilled its commitments which included:

- Completing the 'Building Trust in Journalism in Central Eastern Europe' project, in partnership with Evens Foundation and supported by Fritt Ord. Since 2020, the EJN has researched and produced a series of reports on the respective media landscapes of Poland, Hungary, Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Slovakia and Georgia. The report on Ukraine was due to be published in February 2022 but was delayed due to the Russian invasion. The report was updated to examine the impact of the invasion on Ukraine's media landscape and was finally published as Ukraine media: defiance and truth-telling the frontline struggle for information and democracy in July 2023. In the interim period, the EJN commissioned a series of essays on the ethical challenges of reporting conflict; these essays were published on the EJN website in English, with Ukrainian and Russian translations. The report was launched at the Brussels Press Club on 10th July 2023 with a panel discussion featuring media leaders from Ukraine as well as specialists from UNESCO, Reporters sans frontières (RSF), the Global Forum for Media Development (GFMD), and the EJN.
- Completing the 'Journalism Education for Democracy in Ukraine: Developing Standards, Integrity
 and Professionalism (DESTIN)' project, funded by the EU's Professionalism Erasmus and Key Action
 2 (KA2) project. The work was further highlighted in a section on journalism education in the EJN's
 report, Ukraine media: defiance and truth-telling the frontline struggle for information and
 democracy.
- Commencing discussion on Phase 3 of the Building Trust in Media in South-East Europe & Turkey project in partnership with UNESCO and funded by the European Union Directorate-General for Neighbourhood and Enlargement Negotiations (DG NEAR). The EJN continues to support media outlets in South-East Europe and Turkey to carry out self-assessment exercises of their commitment to good governance and ethical and professional standards also referred to as ethical audits and continues to participate in the development of the Journalism Trust Initiative (JTI), a transparency tool developed by Reporters Sans Frontieres (RSF) and designed to promote trustworthy journalism. As part of Phase 3, the EJN's project activities have included:
 - o commissioning and publishing reports from media organisations in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and Montenegro, on their experiences of completing the ethical audits;
 - o gathering representatives of media organisations from across the region to attend a workshop in Istanbul in April 2024 to discuss issues of transparency, self-assessment and new business models in a regional context facing extraordinary challenges.
- Reporting the results of the Structural racism in UK newsrooms' project supported by the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust. The EJN completed its first active UK project with the publication of its research in March 2023. The report is based on 27 in-depth interviews with Black journalists and stakeholders who have or are currently working in national mainstream media newsrooms across print, online and broadcast media. It concludes that although the proportion of Black African and Caribbean journalists has increased in recent years, and there has been a heightened sense of the possibility for change since 2021 with the increased momentum of the Black Lives Matter movement, Black journalists interviewed confirmed that newsroom processes continued to be exclusionary and racism commonplace. The report, which makes recommendations on how to address structural racism in UK newsrooms, was launched with a panel discussion between prominent journalists of colour and academics and was hosted by the Sir Lenny Henry Centre for Media Diversity and The Film and Television Charity. The launch was attended by specially invited guests from the news and media industry with the specific aim of influencing and informing prominent stakeholders; the event was also live-streamed, and a recording of the event is available on the EJN's YouTube channel. The report has received national media and social media coverage and has been the subject of discussion amongst industry stakeholders. In March 2024, the report was referenced in the Reuters Institute's own report on Race and Leadership in the news media 2024

Other activities in this period:

- Al and Journalism: the formation of a sub-committee of EJN trustees and advisors to collaborate on an 'Al Charter in Media' project launched by RSF in partnership with civil society organisations, experts in artificial intelligence, media representatives and journalists. In July 2023 Aidan White joined an international committee of 21 distinguished members from 13 different countries, academics and professionals in the fields of journalism, Al and digital technologies, led by Maria Ressa, the 2021 Nobel Peace Prize laureate. This committee published the Paris Charter on Al and Journalism on the occasion of the Paris Peace Forum in November 2023.
- In October 2023, the EJN endorsed the Global Forum for Media Development's White Paper, which
 appeals to donors and stakeholders in advocating for long-term financial support for Ukrainian
 media.
- In November 2023, Christopher Hird attended the European Centre for Press and Media Freedom's
 RE:COVER conference in Poland, which examined the impact of the Russian invasion on the
 Ukrainian media landscape and how it might be rebuilt after the war. Christopher participated in
 a panel discussion on the theme of Reporting for a Good Cause: The relationship between activism
 and journalism.
- Also in November 2023, Aidan White gave the keynote address, Education and Journalism: Making
 Al Safe for Humanity, at the 11th WISE Summit in Qatar, speaking about the challenges faced by
 journalists and news media in identifying, combating, and debunking disinformation. The WISE
 Summit is a major global education event held every two, years in Qatar.
- Publication of opinion pieces by Aidan White on the EJN's website and shared on social media:
 Journalists feel the pain, but the Gaza story must be told, on the challenges of reporting the conflict
 in Gaza (October 2023); and Media slaughter in Gaza and government hypocrisy over killing of
 journalists, on how the slaughter of journalists among the thousands of civilian casualties in the
 Gaza conflict reveals how international standards for the protection of media staff are hopelessly
 inadequate (March 2024).

Alongside the successful delivery of these projects the year ending 31 March 2024 has been one of transition for the EJN. Following the departure of the Director & CEO in February 2023, the Board re-evaluated the priorities for the EJN given that the organisation lacked the financial capacity to engage a new director. The priorities were revised to focus on:

- actively pursuing a suitable partnership with a larger organisation with similar aims and objectives, to ensure the EJN's future;
- maintaining the wealth of material created through the projects undertaken over the time the EJN
 has been operating and ensuring that it could remain freely accessible;
- fulfilling our commitments to existing projects and the funding partners;
- managing the organisation within its financial capacity; and
- exploring new, sustainable project opportunities.

Management of the organisation and delivery against these priorities became the direct responsibility of the Board, some of whom became directly involved in much of the day-to-day activity.

A key element of this was the development of a partnership for the EJN to be merged into. Having found an excellent potential organisation very quickly, which resulted in the preparation of an approved Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), further progress was slow. Activity which was anticipated to take a few months was drawn out eating into the dwindling general funds. At the end of the financial year we were still on target to merge, but by June 2024 the partner had withdrawn from the Memorandum of Understanding and we needed to find other financial resources to continue.

Future plans

The withdrawal of Reporters Sans Frontières from the MoU left the EJN in a tricky position which the Board is still working to resolve. The Trustees continue to pursue and carry out new projects within our strategic and geographic scope and the constraints of our available resources. These include:

- Continuing Phase 3 of the 'Building Trust in Media in Southeast Europe and Turkey' programme with UNESCO. We aim at coordinating and organising a series of meetings, and public events in the next phase. The EJN will also gather the main media editors and managers and other key relevant stakeholders at the regional conference in Brussels to promote the brand of "media ethical labelling" and adopt a series of recommendations for fostering media ethics in the region. Our intention is to continue working and coordinating our activities with the press councils and other relevant journalists' associations and initiatives in the region.
- In parallel with the UNESCO project, we are working with the Thomson Foundation as part of its "Western Balkans Media for Change" project, mentoring media outlets in the region to perform ethical audits and self-assessment exercises against the Journalism Trust Initiative (JTI) criteria. The EJN, which played a role in the original development and launch of the JTI, uses the extensive training material produced by our experts. These include infographics, tutorials and video explainers, as well as summaries of the 18 JTI Standard Clauses. The EJN applies a tailor-made approach for each organisation by conducting needs and risk assessments for each outlet. This project is due to run from September 2024 to February 2025.
- Re-establishment of the accountablejournalism.org website, a database of codes of conduct, self-regulation, press councils and media commissions from all around the world. Originally created in 2016 by the Department of Journalism at the University of Missouri in partnership with the EJN, it now requires new funding and resources to update and to manage it going forward. To do so would give the EJN enormous scope with which to monitor and maintain standards of ethical journalism, particularly following the introduction of Al and the development of internal self-regulation policies to deal with the use of Al, and the rise of fact-checking organisations to address misinformation and disinformation in the media.
- China: exploring the re-establishment of educational lines of activity that the EJN had with Chinese
 university departments and ethical commissions before they were suspended due to COVID-19.
- Exploring the potential role of a Scandinavian Taskforce to provide support to professional editors and journalists in European countries with low scores on the World Press Freedom Index through partnerships with media, governmental and non-governmental institutions.
- Structural racism in UK newsrooms: exploring potential partnerships for further research;
- Ukraine: following up on the recommendations in our Ukraine report, particularly in the area of training journalists;
- Continuing to seek partnerships with other media organisations and funders as the key to the EJN's
 future and the preservation and proliferation of its intellectual property, as well as the furtherance
 of its aims and objectives in promoting ethical journalism as a precious resource that builds respect
 for democracy and human rights.

Financial review

Results for the year

The deficit for the year, prior to transfers between funds, on general funds was £31,378 (2023: £34,837) and the surplus on restricted funds was £5,940 (2023: £3,685 - deficit). The transfer between the funds reflects the time spent by EJN resources supporting projects and the work of EJN supporters carried out on projects without charge which gives rise to a pro bono contribution to the EJN.

After transfers of funds, there is a balance carried forward on general funds of £1,984 (2023: £13,707) and on restricted funds of £0 (2023: £13,715).

Financial review (Continued)

Reserves policy

The reserves policy seeks to balance spending the maximum amount of income raised as soon as possible after receipt with maintaining the minimum level of reserves to maintain uninterrupted operation. The reserves held ensure the ongoing liquidity of the organisation and would be sufficient to manage an orderly wind-up, in the unlikely event this was required. On this basis, it is assessed that holding sufficient reserves to cover overheads for a 4–6-month period is prudent for the EJN. The actual amount held will vary based on current and forecast financial circumstances.

The reserves policy has been breached. During this period of transition external assurance has been obtained to ensure the EJN can fulfil its financial obligations as they fall due.

Structure, governance, and management

Constitution

The EJN is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 6th June 2013. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. If the company is wound up, each member is required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

The EJN's Articles of Association were updated in December 2023, to allow for the transfer of the EJN's intellectual property to another organisation of similar aims and objectives even if the organisation was not a registered charity.

Trustees

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Memorandum of Association. The EJN Board endeavours to meet quarterly, or as needed.

There were no changes to the EJN's Board of Trustees membership during this period.

Key management and operations

The EJN's CEO worked, until she left the organisation in February 2023, within an authority delegated by the Board. She reported formally at each Board meeting and informally, between meetings, through regular discussions with the Chair and Treasurer. The CEO worked with the Administrative Assistant, consultants, the regional committees and the advisory group members in delivering the activities of the EJN. Trustees led and participated in committees to ensure alignment with strategic priorities and communication with the Board. The Trustees continue to be very grateful to all committee and advisory group members for their advice, work and time committed.

Following the departure of the CEO, the Administration Assistant has reported directly to the Chair of Trustees and the Treasurer, coordinating the day-to-day operations of the charity and supporting those consultants carrying out projects on behalf of the EJN.

With effect from 17th July 2023, the EJN's registered address changed from International House, Holborn Viaduct, London, EC1A 2BN, to International House, Cornhill, London, EC3V 3NG.

Policies and risk management

The Trustees have ensured that an appropriate list of policies is in place: complaints; conflict of interest; safeguarding; reserves; travel and expenses; diversity and inclusion; equal opportunities; paying staff; bullying and harassment; grievance; disciplinary; whistleblowing; and donation acceptance. Staff and consultants also undertake training as required by project partners to comply with organisational standards and local regulations.

In addition to the risk register to monitor and mitigate organisational risks, the Treasurer and Administration Assistant meet weekly to ensure that any risks are brought to the Trustees' attention promptly to enable informed decision-making. We have also reviewed and updated our insurance policy to ensure appropriate levels of coverage are in place.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued) For the year ended 31 March 2024

1. General information

Ethical Journalism Network is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the company.

The registered office is International House, Cornhill, London, EC3V 3NG.

2. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Ethical Journalism Network meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

While the charity continues to face some uncertainties regarding future funding, the trustees are confident that the charity will continue its operations as a going concern. The trustees have implemented various risk mitigation strategies, including building a sufficient level of unrestricted reserves, diversifying income sources, and actively engaging with key donors, grantors and funders.

Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance Sheet. Where income is received in advance of entitlement of receipt, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent of completion of the service.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs included in support costs are allocated based on time spent.

Expenditure on charitable activities arises from directly undertaking an activity which furthers the company's objectives; the expenditure includes any associated support costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued) For the year ended 31 March 2024

2. Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset evenly over its expected useful economic life at the following annual rates:-

Equipment

50% straight line

Assets under £200 are not capitalised on the balance sheet.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at rates of exchange ruling at the reporting date.

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate ruling on the date of the transaction.

Exchange gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments. Currently the EJN only holds cash at bank.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities comprising income debtors, cash at bank and creditors for operating costs. These assets and liabilities are initially recorded at cost and subsequently at the amounts expected to be received or paid.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions applied by donors or which have been raised by the company for discrete purposes. The costs of raising and administering the activities the funds are applied to are charged against the specific fund.
